





Classic parts swap rekindles passion for enthusiasts of long-obsolete automobiles

MAYNARD – Being the owner of a Model A Ford is a circle few can travel in.

Those who do tend to stand out in the crowd they draw, bringing enjoyment to those around them.

And for one day in March, the center of that local experience lands in Maynard.

On Sunday, March 20, the Minuteman Model A Ford Club will hold its annual Winter Blahs Auto Parts MODEL A, *Page B5* www.metrowestdailynews.com

'Model' citizens going car-crazy

MODEL A, From B1 Swap N' Sell Meet at the Maynard Lodge of Elks, 34 Powdermill Road. According to club member Barbara Tallone of Acton, the event offers attendees the chance to pick up everything from parts they need to posters and reproductions of old advertisements.

Last year, the Swap N' Sell drew 40 vendors and between 150 and 200 people, Tallone said, not bad considering the first Model A rolled off the lines in 1928 and production ended in 1931.

"It is all antique automobilerelated," Tallone said. "You have to have something related to have a slot."

Based in Sudbury, the 40year-old Model A Club has a membership of around 150, Tallone said. Tallone and her husband, Gene, have been members since 1992 when told about the club by the person from whom they bought their first Model A, a 1931 coupe.

"He saw it on the side of the road one day coming home from work, and he just fell in love with it," she said. "He always thought he would like to have one to work on."

Two years ago, the couple joined the Maynard Auto Club, of which treasurer John Erb can also boast ownership of a 1929, rumble-seat-equipped Model A Roadster. The previous owners had planned a restoration as a

grandfather/grandson project, but it never happened, Erb said. Although the car is not roadworthy now, Erb said it made an appearance in the Maynard Christmas Parade two years ago, albeit on the back of a flathed "When you travel on a tour, you can practically build a car on the road," she said. "If anybody breaks down, one of the others usually has a part with them."

Parts for the Model A, ranging from reproductions to orig nal factory issue, are found through magazines and flea markets like the one coming to Maynard, Erb said. In recent years, Erb said more and more are found on the Internet auction site eBay, where he sold the body of his Model T.

While driving the car is the u timate goal, Erb said he enjoys shopping for parts and meetin other owners, too.

Often, he said, if looking for original parts, owners will refurbish the cars "piece by piece," finding a part that may be in better condition than theirs and swapping it out. The other part can then be resold to someone else looking for that part.

There are other collectible markets, too, Erb said.

At one time, half of the world's cars were built by Forc he said. As a result, entire mar kets sprang up, tools and kits built by other manufacturers but designed for Fords.

But all of the work does lead to one goal, driving the cars.

"Spring. It's a new season," Erb said. "It kind of gets our blood boiling to get them out or the road."

Because driving an antique car is not allowed unless on the way to a show, parade or club event, Erb jokes the Model A Club finds plenty of reasons to get together and drive their cars.

"A" for effort

"They surrounded it with lights and presents around it with a sign, 'Will it be ready for Christmas?' " he said with a laugh.

Erb said his passion for antique cars dates back to his childhood, when a friend's father owned a Model A.

Having "always been mechanically attracted to cars," Erb said while in high school he and four friends found a Model T in a junkyard and decided to rebuild it.

"I'm the one who lasted the longest, interest-wise," he said.

Erb bought his first Model A in Lexington for S350 just after he and his wife married. The car came home on the back of a flatbed that a friend used to haul restaurant garbage.

"That was a good sign that marriage was going to work," he joked. "I didn't have a garage or anything. We got it home on the back of a garbage truck."

Description Some parts, that first Model A is gone. Erb's latest Model A was just a chassis when he bought it with money gained by selling the wooden reproduction body from his Model T, the chassis of which still sits in his garage as a future project.

As with many Model A Fords, Erb said the original body had probably been removed when the vehicle was converted for other uses, like a flatbed. Many of those bodies can now be seen on amusement park rides, like the "Tumblebug."

While some Model A owners just like the driving experience, paying others to rebuild and maintain the cars, Erb said he enjoys "puttering around" on the car between his busy schedule.

"I won't change the oil in my regular car but I'll change it in this," he joked.

Part of that has to do with the complexity of modern engines. Erb said. The same sentiments were echoed by Tallone, who notes the older cars are much easier to work on for owners who may not be mechanics.

"There are no surprises under the hood of a Model A," she said.

It is an advantage that helps Model A Club members when they go on tours together in the good weather season, Tallone said. Often, if one car breaks down or has a problem, another owner has the part needed to fix the car on the spot. "They go everywhere, it may be to an orchard or a trip for ice cream," Erb said.

Tallone agreed, noting club members also take trips to auto museums or antique shopping. Wherever they go, they draw a lot of attention, she said. On Wednesdays in accommodating weather, several of the retired members get together for breakfast she said, making it an "official event" in which to drive the cars.

Some drivers wear costumes representing the era, Tallone noted. Her own car is made up to exactly how it would have looked in its day, including the glass flowerpot on its side.

"You can't go anywhere, even if you just stop at the supermarket, without someone coming over and asking about it," Tallone said. "Older people are more sentimental, some remember learning to drive on a Model A. For the younger people, it's 'What is it?"

"Kids get a kick out of it. They get really excited and have a lot of questions like 'How far can you drive this thing?' As if it is a wind-up car," she said with a laugh.

Erb noted, in his case, the attention is welcome, reminiscing about the first time he started the car and "filled his neighborhood with smoke" from oil in a cylinder. Like other hobbies, he noted, the finished work brings "satisfaction."

"You're proud of your car, proud of what you've achieved," he said. "You are taking something old and rusty and making it work."

A Sunday drive can be taken in any car, Erb said. But the experience is different in an antique car.

"With an old car, it kind of makes it special," Erb said. "People toot and wave. They're happy to see you."

That reaction is part of the allure for Tallone, too.

"Just think, you are driving a piece of history," she said.

"These cars changed the world. It's a unique feeling to have that 70-year-old piece of metal in your garage."
